Course Description

The purpose of this course is to introduce you to the cultural region of Europe. In this regional course, we will explore how various physical and cultural elements integrate to give a unique identity to a place or group of places such as Europe. During the semester we will study the "continent" from a variety of geographic perspectives including: physical, environmental, economic, social and political. We will discuss current issues of Europe, with a particular focus on the European Union.

Course Objectives

- Critically evaluate conceptions of Europe as both a physical place and a cultural idea.
- Locate, identify, and understand the importance of the major countries, cities, and physical features of Europe.
- Understand the major regional and international issues facing Europe.
- Develop knowledge of the Europoean Union (EU), and current challenges to the EU.
- Demonstrate knowledge of Europe through a variety of forms, including critical discussions on contemporary issues, a writing assignment, and a plan for a detailed European trip or a paper on a current event in Europe.

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Discussion Posts (Canvas)

Each week of this course, students are responsible for a discussion post. Most weeks, I will give a prompt beforehand; occasionally the discussion will be open for you to respond to whatever in the week's readings or material most interests you. Each post should be about 200-250 words. Students will also be responsible for replying to at least one of the other posts in their discussion group each week. The posts will be located under "Discussions" on the course Canvas site. **Original posts are due by 11:59 pm on Wednesday. Replies will be due by 11:59 pm on Friday.** The first week's post will not be graded; each post after that will be worth 30 points.

Ouizzes

There will be a "Syllabus Quiz" the first week. This quiz is required, but ungraded. There will be a graded quiz each week beginning Week 2. Each quiz will be worth 30 points. The highest six quizzes will count toward the final grade. The quizzes will primarily be multiple choice and relate to readings in GEMW and other readings/texts as indicated and **must be completed by Friday at 11:59 pm each week.** These are 'open-book' quizzes.

Project Assignments

There will be two project assignments that you will complete this semester. The first will be an essay that evaluates a European film or work of literature from a geographic perspective. The second will be to plan a five-week trip to Europe or to write a paper on a current event in Europe. More details for each of these assignments will be provided on Canvas.
