Climate Geopoetics

Drawing upon an article forum just published in *Dialogues in Human Geography*, Magrane will read from a series of climate poems that engage with the multiple narratives or frames of climate change and the Anthropocene. He will contextualize this climate geopoetics project (subtitled “The Earth is a Composted Poem”) in relation to recent poetic and literary responses to climate change and eco- and geo- critical thought. The talk will explore how the geohumanities—and geopoetics in particular—might play a role in examining the multiple ways that climate change is framed, understood, engaged, and contested.

Short Bio:

Eric Magrane is an assistant professor of Geography at New Mexico State University. He is co-editor of the books *The Sonoran Desert: A Literary Field Guide* (University of Arizona Press, 2016) and *Geopoetics in Practice* (Routledge, 2020). Recent work appears in *Bioscience* and *Dialogues in Human Geography* and he is on the editorial boards of the *Annals of the American Association of Geographers* and *Terrain.org*
